Ham—best known for technology
Predominated 4,000 B.C. until 2,000 B.C.
Negroid, Mongoloid, American Indian
Settled in Africa, Far East (China, Japan, etc.), both Americas

Japheth—best known for philosophy
Predominated A.D. 0 until today
Greeks, Romans, Europeans, North Americans
Settled in Europe and North America
