#### "I will dwell in the midst of thee" (2:10)! Zechariah 1-3

"Open thou mine eyes, that I may [regard with pleasure] wondrous things out of thy law" (Ps. 119:18)!

"But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, [even] as by the Spirit of the Lord" (II Cor. 3:18).

Remember to pray for illumination (to be taught of God's Spirit—Jn. 6:45)!

The (preliminary) message of Zechariah is "not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit" (4:6).

"Zechariah, like Haggai, was a prophet to the remnant which returned after the 70 years. There is much of symbol in Zechariah, but these difficult passages are readily interpreted in the light of the whole body of related prophecy. The great Messianic passages are, upon comparison with the other prophecies of the kingdom, perfectly clear. Both advents of Christ are in Zechariah's prophecy (Zechariah 9:9; Matthew 21:1-11; Zechariah 14:3-4). More than Haggai or Malachi, Zechariah gives the mind of God about the Gentile world-powers surrounding the restored remnant. He has given them their authority (Daniel 2:27-40) and will hold them to account; the test, as always, being their treatment of Israel." Scofield notes

# "Ask ye of the LORD rain" (10:1)! **Zechariah 11**

Monday—enjoy reading Zechariah 11:1-17 and the following review overview!

"The predictions of chapter 11 were probably given long after the completion of the Temple of Zerubbabel. The events themselves concern the more distant future from the standpoint of the prophet. The chapter is undoubtedly one of the darkest of Israel's history. And there has been much difference of opinion as to which desolation Zechariah has in mind in the highly poetic words of the first three verses. However, the context of the rest of the chapter is determining and it points unmistakably to the judgment which

resulted from the rejection of the Shepherd of Israel, that destruction which overtook the land and people in AD 70." CLF

- (4) 3:1-10 Joshua the high priest and Jehovah's Servant the BRANCH—Joshua will be approved as high priest and the Messiah will come and "remove iniquity" (through His death)
- (5) 4:1-14 golden candlestick and two olive trees—Israel will be restored as the light of the world through the supply of the Spirit through the LORD's instruments (men)
- (6) 5:1-4 the flying (sc)roll—unrepentant sinners will be cut off (individually)
- (7) 5:5-11 the ephah (measuring container) containing a woman which was carried away—wickedness will be removed nationally (to Shinar which is Babylon)
- (8) 6:1-8 the four chariots and Joshua crowned—God's judgment will descend on all the nations and Joshua crowned pictures the (second) coming BRANCH who will build the Millennial Temple and reign in Jerusalem

Review the question of the men, "Should we continue fasting?" and the LORD's fourfold answer in **chapters 7-8**: please God and not self, execute judgment and show compassion, I will dwell with you and you rebuild, and replace fasting with truth and joy (and be a light to the world).
